I am going to pour over this document and hope that you do also, and please send me your comments. I want to thank everyone who sent me feedback on the draft version last year, especially our Council Representatives, because this enabled the Federation to prepare a dynamite letter. NIGMS Director Jeremy Berg has indicated an interest in maintaining a dialogue between the institute and the scientific community, so we should not feel this conversation has ended with publication of the Plan.

## **NIGMS HOLDS ADVISORY MEETING**

*Meghan McGowan reports:* The National Institute of General Medical Science Advisory Council met on January 25, 2008. In his opening remarks, Dr. Jeremy Berg, NIGMS Director, offered updates since the prior advisory meeting.

*NIH Peer Review Advisory Council (PRAC):* Dr. Berg is co-chair PRAC and reported that within the next couple of months it will release a report identifying pilot projects aimed at modifying and enhancing the peer review process.

*Budget:* The enacted 2008 budget included a minimal increase for NIH overall and NIGMS to remain flat. This constitutes a loss of \$50 million dollars and approximately 150 grants.

*Public Access:* Congress, within the Consolidated Appropriations Act 2008) mandated “all investigators funded by the NIH submit of have submitted for them to the National Library of Medicine’s PubMed Central an electronic version of their final, peer-reviewed manuscripts upon acceptance for publication, to be made publicly available no later than 12 months after the official date of publication” - The NIH Public Access Policy, Division G, Title II, Section 218 of Public Law 110-161 For more, <http://publicaccess.nih.gov/>.

NIGMS Strategic Plan: The NIGMS Strategic Plan is completed and available for viewing at: <http://www.nigms.nih.gov/About/StrategicPlan/>.

There was also an insightful presentation from various NIGMS-funded researchers about the importance, success and implications of intervention programs. These are programs aimed at encouraging and supporting students to pursue degrees and career paths in the biomedical field. For instance, researchers study if certain initiatives are more effective than others; are there institutional factors that influence student majors and careers and examine social/psychological elements that lead to success on the path to a biomedical career. Drs. Merna R. Villarejo (University of California, Davis), Sylvia Hurtado (University of California, Los Angeles) and Martin M. Chemers (University of California, Santa Cruz) presented research on intervention programs and their effectiveness.

## **NIDA HIGHLIGHTS NEUROSCIENCE AND INNOVATIVE RESEARCH INITIATIVES AT RECENT ADVISORY MEETING**

*Meghan McGowan reports:* NIDA Director Nora Volkow addressed the Advisory Council last week. The meeting began with an update on the 2008 budget, stating the enacted funding is well below inflationary increases and results in a net decrease of funds for the agency.

NIDA has a draft strategic plan available for viewing (<http://www.nida.nih.gov/StrategicPlan/Index.html>). Comments and suggestions are encouraged.

NIDA and its Division of Basic Neuroscience and Behavioral Research, working with the Society for Neuroscience, developed NIFv1.0. The Neuroscience Information Framework (NIF) aims to provide a catalog of neuroscience resources with controlled vocabulary. It serves as a means to register and query web resources across biological scales and offers a flexible framework which can adapt to domain evolution. NIF is a semantic foundation for data integration. For more visit: <http://neurogateway.org/catalog/goto.do?page=.home>.

Dr. Alan Krensky, Director of the Office of Portfolio Analysis and Strategic Initiatives (OPASI) presented information gathered from a workshop that was held last December. This workshop explored ways to identify and increase innovative research. The NIH has implemented several awards to foster innovation, including Pioneer Awards and New Innovator Awards. This workshop differentiated innovative research from transformative defining innovative as original, paradigm-shifting research versus transformative, which is revolutionary and paradigm-generating. Several factors which may discourage innovation were identified as the NIH grants review process, the expansion of soft money and the flattening of the budget. In an effort to encourage innovative research, 10 areas for improvement were identified. 1) Create a separate grant mechanism based on track records, as it is with intramural awards. 2) Increase career awards, which will allow space for discovery. 3) Create a separate mechanism for transformative research. 4) Foster new ideas outside the mainstream. 5) Recruit generalists to review applications. 6) Separate salaries from research grants. 7) Awards for career years 3-9 with institutional matches. 8) Reform intramural NIH to focus on high risk research. 9) Promote local environments that encourage risk taking. 10) Fill the gap between basic discovery and commercialization.

**Blending Addiction Science and Treatment: The impact of Evidence-Based Practices on Individuals, Families, and Communities:** This NIDA conference, to be held June 2-3, 2008 in Cincinnati, Ohio, aims to bring together scientists and practitioners. Particular attention will be paid to understanding and communicating the importance of social networks to neuroscience. ### **Departmental Award for Culture of Service in the Psychological Sciences**

The APA Board of Scientific Affairs (BSA) is soliciting nominations for the Departmental Award for Culture of Service in the Psychological Sciences. This Award recognizes departments that demonstrate a commitment to service in the psychological sciences. Departments selected for this award will show a pattern of support for service from faculty at all levels, including a demonstration that service to the discipline is rewarded in faculty tenure and promotion. Successful Departments will also demonstrate that service to the profession is an integral part of training and mentoring.

Service to the discipline includes such activities as departmental release time for serving on boards and committees of psychological associations; editing journals; serving on a review panel; or chairing an IRB. Other culture of service activities that a department would encourage include mentoring students and colleagues; advocating for psychological science's best interests with state and federal lawmakers; and promoting the value of psychological science in the public eye. The focus of this award is a department's faculty service to the discipline and not their scholarly achievements.

Both Undergraduate and Graduate Departments of Psychology are eligible. Self-nominations are encouraged. To submit a nomination the following is required: A letter that describes and illustrates the department's commitment to a culture of service (e.g., nature of the department's commitment, effect on tenure and promotion, mentoring, effect on current and/or former students' activities as a result of the department's focus on

service, etc.). The letter should be no more than three pages long.

Three letters of support are required from individuals familiar with the department's support for a culture of service. (These letters can be from current or past faculty members; a Dean familiar with the department's service program; etc.)

Each Department selected will receive an award of \$5,000 to be used for departmental activities. The deadline for nominations is March 31, 2008. Nominations will only be accepted as electronic submissions to [Culture of Service](#). Please be sure to submit the nomination as a package that includes all the required letters.

The APA Board of Scientific Affairs (BSA) is soliciting nominations for the Award for Distinguished Service to Psychological Science. Nominees will have demonstrated their service to the discipline by aiding in association governance; serving on boards, committees and various psychological associations; editing journals; reviewing grant proposals; mentoring students and colleagues; advocating for psychological science's best interests with state and federal lawmakers; and promoting the value of psychological science in the public eye. Nominees may be involved in one service area, many of the areas, or all of the service areas noted above. An individual's service to the discipline and not a person's scholarly achievements are the focus of this award.

To submit a nomination, provide the following:

A letter of nomination that describes and supports the individual's contributions (e.g., nature of the individual's service to psychological science, positions held, etc.). The nomination letter should be no more than two pages long. Include a curriculum vita.

Three letters of support from individuals familiar with the nominee's service to the discipline (These letters can be from colleagues who have served with the nominee; a Dean familiar with the nominee's service; former students; Association/Society presidents, etc.)

Award recipients will receive an honorarium of \$1,000. The deadline for nominations is March 31, 2008. Nominations will only be accepted as electronic submissions to [Culture of Service](#). Please be sure to submit the nomination as a package that includes the letter of nomination, vita, and three letters of support.

The [APA Board of Scientific Affairs \(BSA\)](#) is soliciting nominations for the Meritorious Research Service Commendation. This commendation recognizes individuals who have made outstanding contributions to psychological science through their service as employees of the federal government or other organizations. Contributions are defined according to service to the field that directly or indirectly advances opportunities and resources for psychological science. This may include staff at federal or non-federal research funding, regulatory or other agencies. Nominees may be active or retired but ordinarily will have a minimum of 10 years of such service. The individual's personal scholarly achievements (i.e., research, teaching, and writing) are not considered in the selection process independent of their service contributions.
